

Focus on reducing inequality and balanced budgets will follow

All city services are important. I'd rather see Council change *how* they spend money on services, vs *whether* they spend money on services. Council should use funds in ways that reduce costs in other categories. For example, by increasing social services funding, can Council reduce spending on emergency services? By investing i n a Housing First program, can Council reduce the cost of shelters, emergency servic es, and social services? Or by investing more in public transit, can Council reduce the cost of road maintenance? Next, taxes and fees paid by those with privilege should b e designed to offset the social and economic costs of pervasive income inequality. Th e economy is healthier when everyone is prospering and spending locally at small- an d medium-sized businesses. Maintaining pervasive income inequality is expensive. M ake the rich pay their share, so the poor can afford to pay theirs. Any tax savings for t he wealthy should free up money for reinvestment in the community -- not for them to hoard for interest or for investment elsewhere. The cap on property tax increases, the n, should be an average -- higher for those with more and lower for those with lower i ncomes. Where taxes are reduced (in actual dollars or in terms of the ratio between c ontribution and cost), the reduction should be achieved through credits for responsible and sustainable business practices, such as paying workers a living wage, providing b enefits, buying supplies from other local businesses, supplying other local businesses and the city at a favourable price, etc. Some services can be paid per use, or annually . A portion of these revenues should be dedicated to reducing income inequality. Like wise, a portion of tax revenues should be dedicated to reducing inequality. If there are increases in fees, users should be informed of what fee-supported privileges cost, fina ncially and socially, and how their fee is being used to offset that cost (e.g., an account of spending supported by increased parking fees might show how the fee off sets not only the cost of operating the parking lot and roads, but also environmental cl eanup, and funding public transit for those who do not drive yet pay the price of car cu lture nonetheless). None of the service types listed above seem to address issues of c limate change or truth and reconciliation. I think this is a mistake. We should be treatin g both of these problems the way we treat debt. Whatever gains or savings we appear to receive by ignoring or under-funding sustainable environmental practices and decol onization, we must add to future budgets as a cost. Our debt to the Anishinaabeg nati ons whose land Sudbury is built upon is already too great to sustain, and Anishinaabe individuals pay the price of our defaulting every day. The longer we continue to live this way, the more it will cost us to make it right. Finally, the city should go into debt if necessary to keep its residents alive. It's not acceptable to balance the budget at the expense of feeding the hungry, caring for the vulnerable, or housing the homeless. Se rvices that mean life or death for people in Sudbury, regardless of their backgrounds and their ability to pay, ought to be non-negotiable. Driving or having a business are p rivileges. Housing is a right.

Please stop developing the KED - it just doesn't ma ke sense between the expenditures and the benefit i t purportedly accrues.

The proposed Casino is intended to be conveniently placed at the front doors of a new arena (of approximately the same seating capacity but set beside the city dump on th e city's outskirts,) to purposely take 75 million out of Greater Sudburians' "disposable" income each year and give back a measly 5 million. Building a money-losing \$100 million dollar arena beside such a money-stealing casino, in order to get that 5 million, is beyond foolish. It is inane, idiotic, bonkers, and reprehensible. The city is worried a bout raising taxes but want Greater Sudburians to increase their present gambling los ses from \$50 million a year to \$75 million a year. TWENTY FIVE MILLION MORE! Ju st so the city can snag a measly extra million and a half? That's all that would be add ed to the city's present haul of about 3.5 to 4 million, compared to existing slots reven ue. Cray-Zee!! And on top of it the city wants to build a hundred million dollar arena to help get citizens to go to the casino!?!?! And the Hundred million dollar money-losing arena will cost \$150 million with the financing!!!! BONKERS!! Absolutely reee-dic-u-lo us!!' And to do it all you also need about a thousand citizens to become problem gam blers, risk their mortgages, forgo home repairs, embezzle here and there, to lose abou t ten to twenty thousand bucks a year, to account for 10-20 million of that \$75 million. Please stop trying to build a new arena, go for a renovation of the existing one instead, and cut the budgets for any new library and art gallery in half. That would mo re than save 14 million. And don't let a casino be any part of the city's budget plans. T he few paltry millions they give back is nothing compared to the tens of millions they t ake.

City Salaries

Likely talking to the wall here but in comparing average salaries and benefits to like si zed cites like Kingston, Burlington, Barrie and Guelph, salaries in Sudbury are anywh ere from 30 to 50% higher than in these other jurisdictions. City managers have been exploited as ineffectual suckers. Freeze salaries for two years and then limit increases for five years at half the increase in the cost of living. Nobody will leave bec ause they will not get a comparable salary elsewhere. Rewrite the HR policies to reflect that salaries will be in line with other jurisdictions. Current salaries can be gran dfathered but the policy will apply as vacated positions are filled. Salaries are the bigg est component of the budget and unless something is done any pretense at likely savings will die an untimely death.

It would b e nice to see a logical and transparent plan for the direction we are heading. I just don 't see any indication of that happening and we shouldn't hold our collective breaths. In terms of Winter Maintenance -

- Can at least 1 side of the street's sidewalks be getting extra care...so, that we dont h ave to walk in the roads (Suggest the South side sidewalks in East-West street, as th e North side gets more sun, so needs less care, in other scenarios identifying the busier more natural side for Pedestrian activity {more stores/services/schools vs sides with less public buildings}. - The amount of driveways on main arterials is a problem(where possible, the City should investigate how to reduce the number of drivewa ys (by redirecting traffic to side streets and/or a main neighbourhood communal drive way for that stretch of buildings - I have already identified such opportunities), cutting along main arterials, as these not only create pockets of extra snow maintenance, but also cost more in sidewalk building, as well as invite more traffic problems/stop& go, collisions, slowed traffic, etc). - as is the method in which the various Private &am p; Public Plowers plow, throwing fresh loose snow onto sidewalks for dozens of meter s, at every corner, and driveway entrance, ruining the work that the Sidewalk Plowers i ust did... enhanced Coordination of activities needed. - I could not watch last night's z oom council meeting I was too busy walking in the roadways to try to get to the bus st ops...which leads to an altogether more pressing point for us... Bus Stops are clearly placed along roadways so as to be less of a inconvenience to Motorists than they are placed to be convenient for Bus Riders... moving bus stops to be of top convenience f or Bus Riders, giving priority to Bus Riders is needed... in many instances, bus bays could be built. The GOVA Operators need to be communicated to pick up/drop off Passengers at cleared areas.. Since winter maintenance is so costly.. and time consu ming, until bus stops are cleared...the nearest cleared driveway ought to be sought by Bus Drivers as "natural" drop off/pick up points. Thank you.


Increase the budget to fleet services.



Defund the GSPS

In a interview with CTV News dated January 13th, Police Chief Paul Pedersen said "We've seen an over 300 per cent increase in opioid-related calls". "We'veseen a 448 per cent increase in mental-health calls." Evidence demonstrates that the epidemic is i ntimately linked with structural inequities (e.g. entrenched poverty, strained health car e and social service systems, and lack of affordable housing) in ways that disproportio nately impact BIPOC. While street-level policing practices in street-based drug scenes are often cited as critical to limiting access to the drug supply and reducing violence and disorder they disproportionately target and impact racialized persons. Re search has demonstrated how policing models are not effective, but rather contribute to additional harms, including increased violence and that those cases are better handled by organizations that have the skills and expertise to address them – so THEY should be getting increased funding. Not the police.



Invest in comminity programs. Social services. Also remember: parks are for people. Homeless people a re people. Embarassing mayor/council.






Defund the Greater Sudbury Police



Redirect funds to social development services such as long-term housing for homel ess communities, food security programs, public health services, community-led antiviolence programs and training, and to services supporting victims of sexual assault and gender-based violence.
