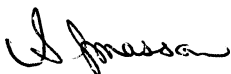


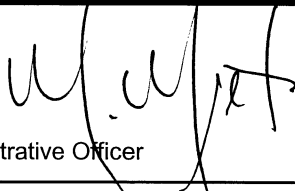

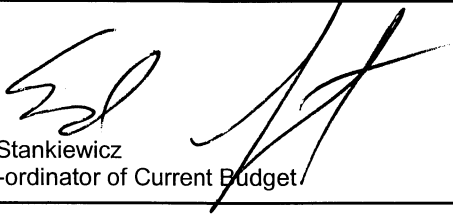

Division Review

BACKGROUND

Effective January 1, 2005, most miscellaneous user fees will be increased by the rate of inflation as per Council policy. The inflationary factor is determined by the September Consumer Price Index, which is 1.8 percent.

The current policy and by-law applies to all user fees with the exception of water, wastewater, waste management and police fees, which are covered under different by-laws.

Some recreational user fees will reflect the inflationary increase effective September 1, 2005 to coincide with the playing season. Play field rates for 2005 have been harmonized by Council approval at the December 16, 2004 meeting and therefore have no 2004 meaningful comparator.

Some fees will not be increased as they may adversely affect economic development, such as building fees. In addition, the transit fees have not been increased for 2005 as there were two increases in 2004 fares and staff predicted that increases in 2005 rates would have a negative effect on ridership. Other changes to fees are too costly to the operation, such as parking fees which would not generate sufficient revenue to cover off the additional costs of new signage.

In addition the schedule reflects omissions and corrections of some incidental fees.

Since most general fees are rounded to the closest dollar, there may be no increase in 2005 for some fees, as the adjustment would be minimal. In other cases the increase may be greater than the inflation rate, as the new fee has been adjusted for the first time in many years, thus reflecting years of inflation.

With the approval of the Departmental Reorganization at the City of Greater Sudbury by Council, a number of By-laws must be amended or re-written. The most major of these are presented on this agenda for passage by Council, but it is to be expected that a number will require amendment in the upcoming months.

Those being presented to Council at this time up-date references to new departments and new positions, and delete references to positions which no longer exist. In addition to these standard changes, small additional changes have been incorporated to give effect to Council's wishes.

Chief Administrative Officer By-law 2005-14:

1. This By-law outlines the duties and responsibilities of the Chief Administrative Officer. A new provision has been added to allow the Chief Administrative Officer to hire or dismiss all positions within the organization and to enter into employment contracts or termination contracts with employees. A provision has also been added to allow the C.A.O. to utilize any funds established by way of reserve for voluntary exit programs in such termination agreements.

Reserve and Reserve Fund By-law 2005-15:

2. This By-law establishing reserve funds is amended to provide for a reserve fund for voluntary exit programs to be used by the C.A.O. as part of termination agreements.

Appointment By-law 2005-16A:

3. This By-law up-dates the appointment By-law to refer to all new positions and delete references to old positions. It also up-dates the list of clerks at the Community Citizen Service Centres.

Delegation By-law 2005-17:

4. This By-law is up-dated to provide for references to new positions and delete references to old positions. It also includes an up-date to allow the City Solicitor to execute tax sale forms for electronic registration.

As indicated above, these are the By-laws required at this time to give effect to the reorganization, but it is to be expected that further By-law amendments will be presented to Council in the future.

BACKGROUND

Periodically the By-law governing Reserves, Reserve Funds and Trust Funds is reviewed to ensure the content is still applicable and appropriate. This most recent review was undertaken in December, and the following changes are recommended:

1. **Reserve - Valley East Heritage Committee** - this reserve can be deleted once it is fully depleted. The final motion of the committee dedicated the balance of this reserve to maintenance of the Valley East portion of the archives to be housed in the Capreol Citizen Services Centre/Library. The remaining funds will therefore be transferred to the Citizen Services Centre/Library reserve, and tracked within that reserve, for use as requested by the Committee, and outlined above.
2. **Equipment and Vehicle Replacement Reserve Fund** - this reserve fund is comprised of funds for replacement of Public Works, Parks, Transit and Fire fleet. Contributions to the fund, and approved expenditures from the fund have been tracked, keeping transactions relative to each fleet separate. However, since each of these fleets is administered by a separate department of the City, this fund should be split into four separate reserve funds, with the year-end balances for each of the four being credited to the appropriate reserve fund, for ease of administration, as follows:

Equipment and Vehicle Replacement Reserve Fund - Public Works (approximately \$1.2 million)

- annual equipment rates in the budget shall contain a provision for straight-line depreciation which shall form contributions to this Reserve Fund
- salvage values received from the sale of used Public Works equipment or vehicles shall be credited to this Reserve Fund
- this Reserve Fund shall be used to purchase new Public Works equipment and vehicles as approved through the Capital Budget process, or as otherwise authorized by Council.

Equipment and Vehicle Replacement Reserve Fund - Parks (approximately \$120,000)

- annual equipment rates in the budget shall contain a provision for straight-line depreciation which shall form contributions to this Reserve Fund
- salvage values received from the sale of used Parks equipment or vehicles shall be credited to this Reserve Fund
- this Reserve Fund shall be used to purchase new Parks equipment and vehicles as approved through the Capital Budget process, or as otherwise authorized by Council.

Date: January 7, 2005

Equipment and Vehicle Replacement Reserve Fund - Transit (approximately \$700,000)

- annual budgeted amounts shall be contributed to this Reserve Fund
- salvage values received from the sale of used Transit equipment or vehicles shall be credited to this Reserve Fund
- this Reserve Fund shall be used to purchase new Transit equipment and vehicles as approved through the Capital Budget process, or as otherwise authorized by Council.

Equipment and Vehicle Replacement Reserve Fund - Fire (approximately \$132,000)

- annual budgeted amounts shall be contributed to this Reserve Fund
- salvage values received from the sale of used Fire equipment or vehicles shall be credited to this Reserve Fund
- this Reserve Fund shall be used to purchase new Fire equipment and vehicles as approved through the Capital Budget process, or as otherwise authorized by Council.

3. **Pioneer Manor Reserve** - since the Pioneer Manor project is now almost complete, and the financing is put in place, this Reserve Fund should be collapsed. The balance should be transferred to the Capital Financing Reserve Fund - Health and Social Services.
4. **Capital Financing Reserve Fund - Health and Social Services** - some changes will be needed in the wording to reflect the transfer from the Pioneer Manor Reserve. In addition, Provincial revenue for High Wage Subsidy and any additional subsidy received as a result of reconstruction, beyond the amount required for debt repayment, shall be credited to this Reserve Fund.
5. **Economic Development / Community Loan Reserve Fund** - This Reserve Fund has now been fully committed. The balance should be transferred to the Capital Financing Reserve Fund - Economic Development (committed) and the Reserve Fund collapsed.
6. **Capital Financing Reserve Fund - Economic Development** - some changes will be needed in the wording to reflect the transfer from the Economic Development / Community Loan Reserve Fund, and the commitments reflecting decisions made during the 2005 Current Budget process: This balance is dedicated to be transferred to the Economic Development Capital Envelope as follows: 2005 - \$350,000; 2006 - \$350,000; and 2007 - the remaining balance (approximately \$350,000).
7. **Fitness Centre Reserve Fund** - fund is depleted, delete from by-law.
8. **Emergency Services Ambulance Reserve Fund** - Contributions to this reserve fund are budgeted each year; however, the wording of the by-law does not reflect this. A clause needs to be added to the by-law as follows:
 - (1) Annual budgeted amounts for vehicle and equipment replacement shall be credited to this reserve fund.
9. **Whitewater Lake Park Reserve Fund** - needs to be reactivated: Proceeds from the sale of some lots have been dedicated to this Reserve Fund; any expenditures to be made from this Reserve Fund are to be for improvements to the park, and are to be authorized by Council.

A few minor wording changes, throughout the by-law, which do not change the intent of the reserve or reserve fund, but simply add clarification are also required, and will be looked after by Legal Services.

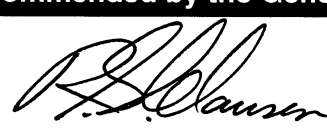

Background:

The City's Transportation Engineering Services' Section has received complaints regarding vehicles parking along both sides of King Street in Capreol.

King Street is a local residential street located adjacent to Capreol's Central Business District (see Exhibit 'A'). King Street is constructed to an urban standard with an asphalt surface width of approximately 8 metres. The Capreol Fire Hall is located on the southeast corner of the intersection of King Street and Young Street. Last year, parking was prohibited on both sides of King Street adjacent to and opposite the Fire Hall property at the request of the Fire Department and in conformance with the general provisions of the Traffic and Parking By-Law.

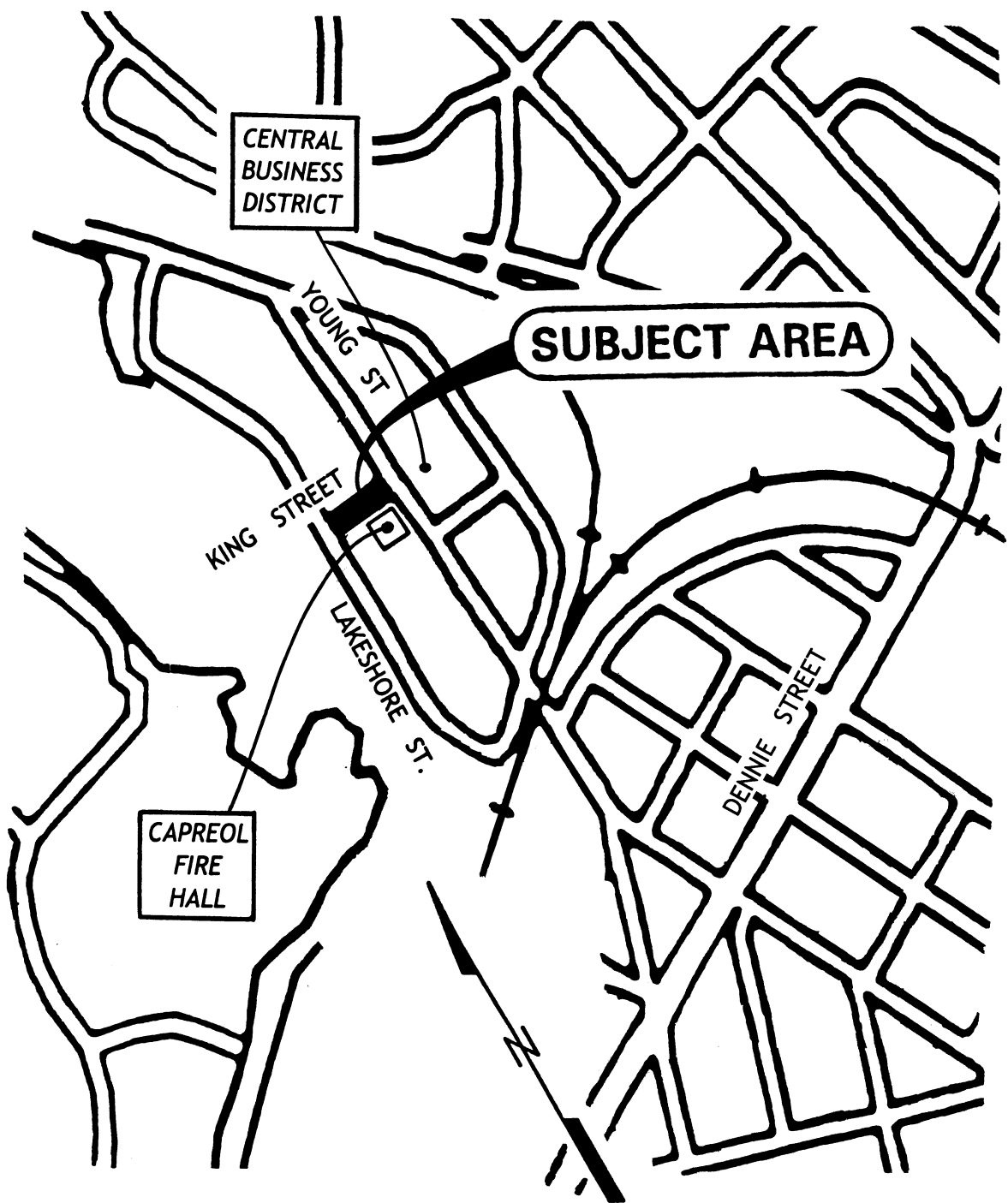
Vehicles are parking along both sides of King Street due to its proximity to the Central Business District and Call Centre. The City's By-Law Department has enforced the general provisions of the Traffic and Parking By-Law with limited success. Recently, complaints about parking on King Street have been received from the City's Fire Department and Public Works Department, as well as Northway Bus Lines.


The primary function of a public road is for the safe movement of traffic. On-street parking is usually permitted when this criteria is met. The presence of parked vehicles along both sides of King Street is restricting access for emergency and maintenance vehicles, as well as buses.

It is recommended that parking be prohibited along both sides of King Street from Lakeshore Street to Young Street.

It is also recommended that a By-Law be passed to amend the City of Greater Sudbury Traffic and Parking By-Law 2001-1 to implement the recommended change.

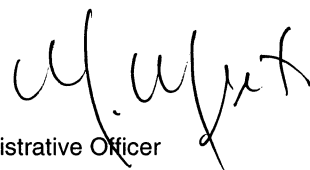

Background:

The City's Transportation Engineering Services' Section has received a request from the Sudbury Student Services Consortium to prohibit parking on both sides of Dublin Street in front of St. Raphael School from Attlee Street to the school's entrance, (see Exhibit 'A').

Dublin Street is a residential street located in New Sudbury (see Exhibit 'B'). It is constructed to an urban standard with an asphalt surface width of 11.5 metres and a sidewalk along the north side. St. Raphael School is located on the north side of Dublin Street approximately 65 metres west of Attlee Avenue.

At the request of the Sudbury Student Services Consortium, parking is currently prohibited along the south side of Dublin Street directly opposite the school frontage. They have indicated that problems are still occurring further to the east on Dublin Street due to buses travelling in both directions and parents parking on both sides of the road to pick-up and drop-off their children. Problems become even worse with the presence of snowbanks further reducing the width of the road.

Based on safety concerns expressed by the Sudbury Student Consortium, staff supports their request. To minimize the possible inconvenience to area residents, it is recommended that the parking prohibition only be in effect during normal school hours from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday to Friday inclusive.

Staff recommends that a by-law be passed to amend By-Law 2001-1 Traffic and Parking to implement the recommended change.

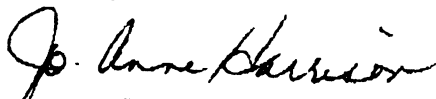
Dear Dave:

As always we thank you for your prompt attention to this safety concern.

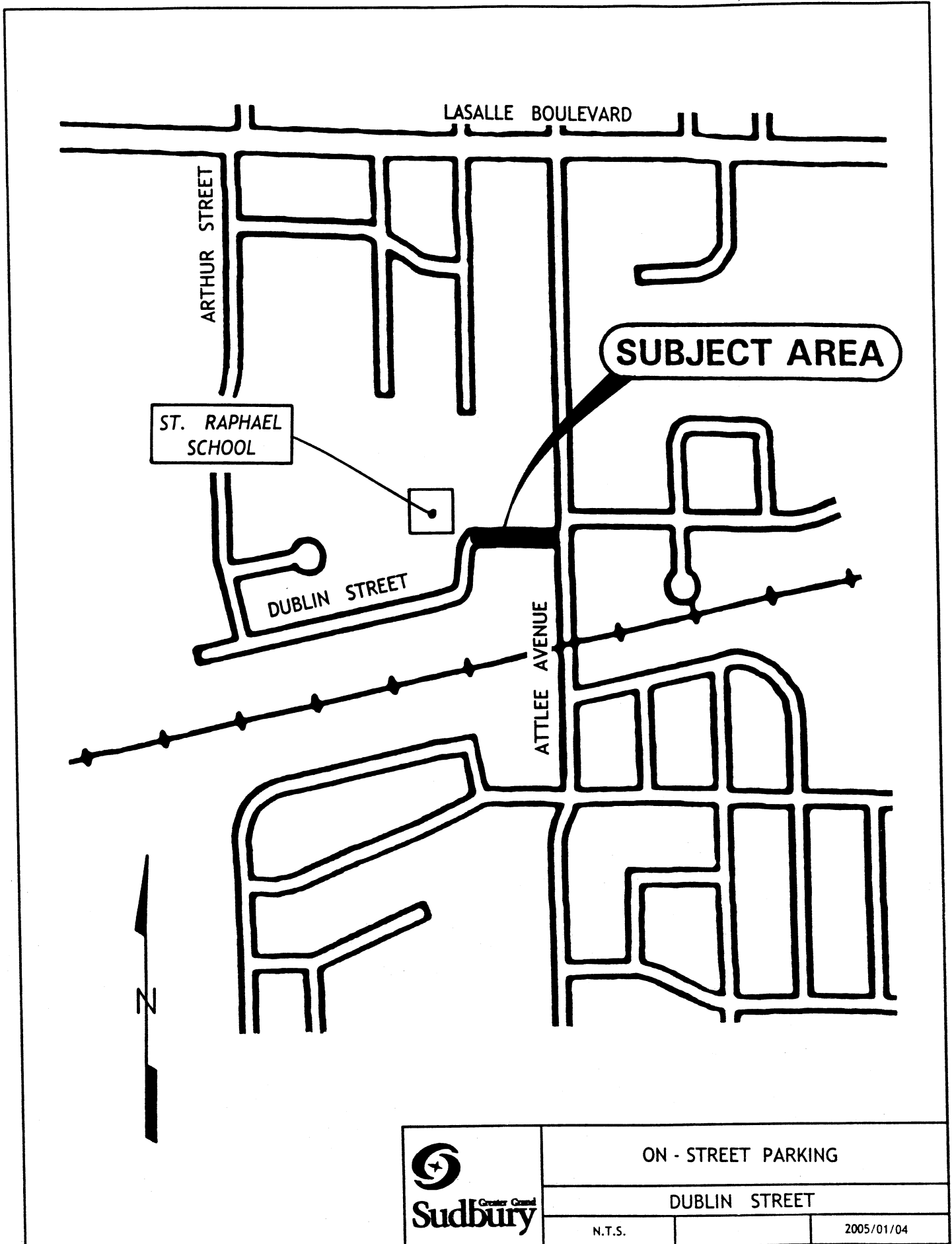

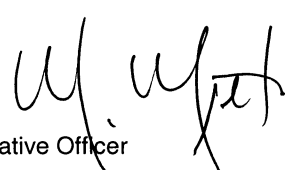

Background

In order to meet the new drinking water requirements, it is necessary to enhance the disinfection in the wells supplying the Capreol, Dowling and Valley East Water Distribution Systems. In each case the installation of primary disinfection through UV Technology is the most appropriate solution.

To that end, the City requested that proposals be submitted for the supply of appropriate UV Disinfection Systems. Proposals were received in the Fall of 2004. The proposals have now been reviewed by our Project Evaluation Team.

Proposals were received from the following companies:

- Synergy Controls Corporation
- Trojan Technologies Inc.
- WEDECO

Our Evaluation Team unanimously selected the proposal from Trojan Technologies Inc. and recommend that the City adopt their technology as the standard for UV Disinfection Systems for our Municipal Wells.

With the preselection of the equipment now complete, the designers will proceed with final detailed design for the upgrades at each of the Municipal Wells.

The actual supply and the installation of this equipment will occur as part of at least four construction projects that will be tendered in the future. Each of these contracts will include for installation of Trojan UV Disinfection equipment. Each of those contracts will have predetermined financial allowances in them for the supply of equipment by Trojan Technologies Inc. based on the proposals and clarifying documents submitted as part of this process.

The cost of the equipment represented 10% of the evaluation matrix. We attach the following summary for information to inform Council of the approximate capital cost of the equipment:

The base bids submitted by the various proponents, in some cases, did not totally reflect the requirements outlined in the Terms of Reference. The Evaluation Committee, after discussion with the three companies, adjusted the base price to accurately reflect the requirements of the Terms of Reference. Based on the Committee's recommendations it is estimated that the cost of the Trojan Equipment to be supplied in future contracts will be approximately \$1,200,000.00 which includes GST.

As part of the evaluation the Team also considered maintenance and operating costs and found that the Trojan System was slightly superior to the WEDECO System in this regard.

Another major consideration was the cost of retrofitting these systems into the pump houses at each of the wells. A review of the piping modifications, structural modifications, etc., needed to install the selected equipment was completed by the Evaluation Team. The Trojan Equipment provides the flexibility necessary to implement their technology in the most cost effective way.

Council should also be aware that Calgon Carbon Corporation holds a process patent for the use of UV for the purposes of inactivation of cryptosporidium. Because of their patent, Calgon may charge the City for the uses of the patent, \$0.015 per thousand gallons of water treated. If that were to happen our annual cost at the present water usage would be approximately \$6,000.00. As part of the budget process in 2006 we will recommend that a financing reserve be created with a contribution of \$6,000.00 annually for these wells. This will position the Municipality to meet any future obligations with regard to patent royalties. The funding for the final supply and installation of this equipment has been carried in the 2002 through 2005 Capital Budgets for Water. In fact, additional funding will be required in 2006 to complete all of the upgrades necessary in the case of the Valley East System.

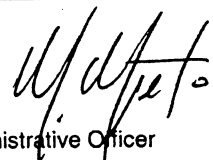

In May 2004, the City of Greater Sudbury through its EarthCare Sudbury Initiative was invited to submit an expression of interest in response to a request for proposals from the Government of Canada for their One Tonne Challenge program. At that time, an application was submitted. In October we received notification from the Government of Canada that Greater Sudbury was one of the 41 communities, out of 88 submissions, chosen to role out the One Tonne Challenge program. The attached Backgrounder includes a list of other communities that are involved.

Barb McDougall-Murdoch, accepted the "Community Challenge" on behalf of the City and EarthCare Sudbury during a November 3rd meeting with the Honourable Stephane Dion, Federal Minister of the Environment, and other One Tonne Challenge community representatives from across Canada. Following the meeting, delegates participated in a two day workshop to find out more about the program and the role that they will play in delivering the program in their respective communities.

Greater Sudbury is receiving financial support from Environment Canada to participate in this pilot project, that will continue until March 2006. An initial contribution of \$30,000 was awarded to the 41 successful communities. Communities are now in the process of finalizing their work plans, and are working with Environment Canada on contribution agreements that would provide communities with additional funding for their campaigns in the range of \$30,000-\$100,000.

EarthCare Sudbury plans to bring together its Community Partners for a workshop to provide input in the development of an implementation plan to deliver the OTC campaign in Greater Sudbury.

What is the One Tonne Challenge?

The One Tonne Challenge is a Government of Canada initiative that calls on individual Canadians to take action on climate change and clean air by reducing their greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions by one tonne, or roughly 20%, at home, at work, and on the road. (On average, individual Canadians produce five tonnes of GHGs each year).

The One Tonne Challenge will use both a national marketing campaign and partnerships at the national and local level to:

- create awareness and understanding of the benefits of action to reduce GHG emissions,
- offer practical tools to help Canadians create personal emissions reduction plans,
- provide prompts, recognition and support for individual and collective action, and
- ensure Canadians are aware of programs, products and services available to assist them in reducing emissions.

The program will showcase and support community action. It will develop partnerships with the private sector, youth, and educations, to get behind the challenge and encourage informed consumer purchases and actions.

National promotion and partnerships will be designed to reinforce one another, so that promotion serves as a national backdrop to link and support local and individual action.

Greater Sudbury's Community challenge will support the national program, and strive for individual action at the local level. Our Community Challenge will engage people in Greater Sudbury to take personal actions to reduce their GHG emissions. It will promote locally available products, services, and programs, including government programs, thereby bringing local relevance to the national messaging. It will showcase local accomplishments, and build local pride and confidence in the effectiveness of personal action.

BACKGROUND

One-Tonne Challenge: Community Challenges

Community Challenges will bring together community groups, local governments, school boards, chambers of commerce, business and others to encourage individuals in communities to reduce their emissions, and provide them with easy access to information, programs, services and tools to help them do so.

As with the broader One-Tonne Challenge initiative, the goal of community challenges is to help Canadians reduce their individual greenhouse gas emissions by one tonne (or about 20%).

With a strong focus on local needs and priorities, Community Challenges will link citizens to the national effort on climate change, and offer practical ways for them to take the One-Tonne Challenge.

Many of the communities selected will build on work under way to reduce emissions and improve air quality. In some cases, these communities have undertaken extensive consultation and planning exercises with citizens and stakeholder groups. Support from the One-Tonne Challenge will allow them to move forward with some of the initiatives identified through this planning work.

One of the objectives of community challenges is to pilot different ways of engaging citizens in reducing emissions, so that the most effective approaches can be widely shared among a growing network of communities committed to climate change action.

Another important objective is to support partnerships within communities among different sectors – partnerships that can help to sustain activity and momentum after funding from the One-Tonne Challenge expires. Communities will receive funding over a two year period to help them build these relationships.

Community Challenges began with a call for expressions of interest in the spring of 2004. This invitation to create local challenges resulted in 88 proposals from communities across Canada. These proposals were reviewed in June by an interdepartmental committee including Environment Canada, Transport Canada and Natural Resources Canada and 37 communities were selected.

In Manitoba, communities were identified through a joint process with the Government of Manitoba and their Climate Change Community Challenge (C4) initiative. Four communities have been selected through this process and are part of the Community Challenge workshop.

An initial contribution agreement for \$30,000 is being provided to each selected community. This will facilitate their initial planning and participation in the November Workshop. This workshop will allow communities to finalize their work plans, including more detailed budgets for their activities. The Contribution Agreements with communities will then be amended as necessary to increase or adjust the amount of financial support.

The One Tonne Challenge will use both a national marketing campaign and partnerships at the national and local level to:

- create awareness and understanding of the benefits of action to reduce GHG emissions,
- offer practical tools to help Canadians create personal emissions reduction plans,
- provide prompts, recognition and support for individual and collective action, and
- ensure Canadians are aware of programs, products and services available to assist them in reducing emissions.

The program will showcase and support community action. It will develop partnerships with the private sector, youth, and educations, to get behind the challenge and encourage informed consumer purchases and actions.

National promotion and partnerships will be designed to reinforce one another, so that promotion serves as a national backdrop to link and support local and individual action.

Greater Sudbury's Community challenge will support the national program, and strive for individual action at the local level. Our Community Challenge will engage people in Greater Sudbury to take personal actions to reduce their GHG emissions. It will promote locally available products, services, and programs, including government programs, thereby bringing local relevance to the national messaging. It will showcase local accomplishments, and build local pride and confidence in the effectiveness of personal action.

BACKGROUND

One-Tonne Challenge: Community Challenges

Community Challenges will bring together community groups, local governments, school boards, chambers of commerce, business and others to encourage individuals in communities to reduce their emissions, and provide them with easy access to information, programs, services and tools to help them do so.

As with the broader One-Tonne Challenge initiative, the goal of community challenges is to help Canadians reduce their individual greenhouse gas emissions by one tonne (or about 20%).

With a strong focus on local needs and priorities, Community Challenges will link citizens to the national effort on climate change, and offer practical ways for them to take the One-Tonne Challenge.

Many of the communities selected will build on work under way to reduce emissions and improve air quality. In some cases, these communities have undertaken extensive consultation and planning exercises with citizens and stakeholder groups. Support from the One-Tonne Challenge will allow them to move forward with some of the initiatives identified through this planning work.

One of the objectives of community challenges is to pilot different ways of engaging citizens in reducing emissions, so that the most effective approaches can be widely shared among a growing network of communities committed to climate change action.

Another important objective is to support partnerships within communities among different sectors – partnerships that can help to sustain activity and momentum after funding from the One-Tonne Challenge expires. Communities will receive funding over a two year period to help them build these relationships.

Community Challenges began with a call for expressions of interest in the spring of 2004. This invitation to create local challenges resulted in 88 proposals from communities across Canada. These proposals were reviewed in June by an interdepartmental committee including Environment Canada, Transport Canada and Natural Resources Canada and 37 communities were selected.

In Manitoba, communities were identified through a joint process with the Government of Manitoba and their Climate Change Community Challenge (C4) initiative. Four communities have been selected through this process and are part of the Community Challenge workshop.

An initial contribution agreement for \$30,000 is being provided to each selected community. This will facilitate their initial planning and participation in the November Workshop. This workshop will allow communities to finalize their work plans, including more detailed budgets for their activities. The Contribution Agreements with communities will then be amended as necessary to increase or adjust the amount of financial support.
