Do not bag recyclables. Place items in the Blue Box loosely.

The two exceptions are shredded paper and styrofoam. These items can be placed in separate clear plastic bags.

If your Blue Box is full, you can place the extra recyclables beside it in a cardboard box.

Recycling Tips for Households

- Blue box recyclables must be placed loosely in your blue boxes.
- All waste collection containers including blue boxes should not weigh more than 18 kg / 40 lbs when filled.
- Stack a heavier blue box on top of a lighter blue box so stuff doesn't blow away.
- Place lighter items in the bottom of your blue box and heavier items on top.
- Stand paper and cardboard up-and-down instead of laying them flat so they don't fly away.
- Never over fill your blue boxes. Just call City Services at 3-1-1 to place your order for additional blue boxes or consider purchasing the City's Big Blue recycling container that comes with a lid.



- Remember that paper coffee cups, paper plates and paper towels go in a certified compostable bag for your green cart, and not in your blue box.
- Remember that chip bags, candy wrappers, blister packs, ceramic drinking cups and broken plastic toys are not recyclable and must be placed in the garbage.
- Approximately 50% of your waste can be recycled in the blue box program. Visit www.greatersudbury.ca\ wastemanagement for a complete list of recyclable blue box items or call City Services at 3-1-1 to order an information package.

Broken glass or mirrors should NOT be placed in a garbage bag or blue box.

New Leaf and Yard Trimmings Collection Requirements Coming Soon

For immediate release Wednesday, April 22, 2015

The City of Greater Sudbury is switching to a more environmentally responsible residential leaf and yard trimming collection policy.

Beginning July 1, only compostable paper bags and securely tied bundles will be accepted for residential curbside collection of leaf and yard trimmings. Plastic bags will no longer be permitted.

These requirements will also be changing at landfill sites. Effective September 1, leaf and yard trimmings delivered to the landfill will only be accepted loosely or in compostable paper bags.

"The move to paper bag collection brings us in line with modern environmental practices," said Mayor Brian Bigger. "Compostable paper bags decompose along with the yard waste contents. This will have the added benefit of reducing the costs associated with having to separate and process plastic bags."

Important information about leaf and yard trimmings:

• Place leaf and yard trimmings in approved compostable paper bags or securely tied bundles

• Place approved bags and bundles at the curb anytime after 8 p.m. the evening prior to collection, and no later than 7 a.m. on collection day

• Approved bags and bundles must not weigh more than 40 lbs. (18 kg)

• Bundles of branches must be securely tied, and no more than 4 feet (1.2 metres) in length, and 2 feet (60 centimetres) in width

• Leaf and yard trimming are defined as leaves, grass clippings, twigs and branches, garden clippings, hedge and brush trimmings, natural Christmas trees and other plant materials

• Sod, root balls, stumps from below ground level, and gravel or soil will not be accepted






Potato chip bags are not recyclable, they must be placed in the garbage and not the Blue Box.

Green Holiday Tips

from Greater Sudbury Environmental Services

The City of Greater Sudbury Environmental Services wishes everyone a Green Christmas.

Before Christmas:

Bring reusable bags when you do your Christmas shopping.

For larger items, don't use a bag at all. Just bring the item home in its box.

- When purchasing gift wrap, get the paper type as it is recyclable. Plastic and foil gift wrap are not recyclable and must be thrown in the garbage.
- Consider using alternatives to wrapping paper.

Try using newspapers, catalogues, magazines or even a towel or scarf which would form part of the gift or be reused next year.

Use reusable gift bags rather than gift wrap.

After Christmas:

- Gift boxes, paper gift bags (non-paper strings removed), paper gift wrap, and Christmas cards are all recyclable and should be placed in your Blue Box.
- Tissue wrapping paper, serviettes, facial tissue, disposable paper cups and plates belong in the Green Cart, NOT in the Blue Box.

Place these items in certified compostable bags within your Green Cart. The plastic lid from the paper cup can be placed in the Blue Box.

- Do not bag your mixed blue box recyclables in clear plastic bags or other bags (i.e. grocery bags). Place items loosely in your Blue Box. Collection crews will not collect these bags.
- For surplus recyclable material, use a cardboard box or boxes similar in size to a City blue box.

Make sure that the boxes are placed out beside your Blue Box.

Hard plastic packaging without a number on it (e.g. used to hold toys in a cardboard box) is not recyclable. Please place this plastic in the garbage.

- * Use as little wrapping paper as possible. Loop a string around gift boxes to measure the size of the box, and then lay the string out on the wrapping paper to determine exactly how much is needed.
- * Avoid purchasing products with packaging that is not accepted in the Blue Box Recycling Program, such as Styrofoam packing peanuts.
- * Send e-cards instead of traditional Christmas cards to save on paper.
- Buy gifts with a 'green' touch: a backyard composter, lunch box with re-useable containers, rechargeable batteries, or certified compostable bags for your green cart.
- Wooden orange crates, foil, plastic or cloth gift wrap, ribbons and bows, foil gift bags, foam packaging peanuts and Christmas lights do not belong in the Blue Box or Green Cart.

Please reuse or dispose of them in your household garbage.

 Reuse wooden orange crates instead of throwing them out in your household garbage.

Crates can be reused as a serving tray for drinks and snacks, or as a holder for Christmas ribbons, bows and gift tags or to organize the garage. If you must dispose of your wooden orange crates, they must be placed in the garbage as they are not recyclable or compostable.

- Save wrapping paper, tissue paper, ribbons and bows to reuse next year.
- Save your used Christmas cards to make small gift boxes for next year's presents.
- Reuse plastic tubs, such as ice cream, margarine, yogurt and sour cream containers for storing holiday leftovers instead of buying new storage containers.

- * Choose products made from recycled, post-consumer material.
- Cut down on waste at your holiday party. Use your dishes, glassware and cloth napkins rather than disposables. If you have to use disposable products, buy recyclable or compostable products accepted in the Blue Box or Green Cart organics programs. Foam plates and cups should be rinsed and placed in your Blue Box. Paper plates, cups and napkins should be placed in certified compostable bags within your green cart. All disposable cutlery and straws must be placed in the garbage.
 - When you just can't eat another bite of turkey, place your holiday food scraps in certified compostable bags within your green cart.
 - Natural Christmas trees will be collected and composted as part of the year-round leaf and yard trimmings collection.

Please remove all decorations, tinsel, lights and tree stand. Place your tree at your curb by 7 a.m. on your regular collection day. Christmas trees wrapped in plastic will not be collected.

- Donate unwanted items to a charity, such as Salvation Army, Value Village, Diabetes Clothesline, Jarrett Centre, etc.
- * Batteries may be small but they sure pile up.

Spent batteries are hazardous waste. Help protect our environment by disposing them at the Household Hazardous Waste Depot (open on select Saturdays) or booking with the Toxic Taxi for home collection (Monday to Friday 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.). Toxic Taxi

Don't throw hazardous waste in the garbage, down the sink or in the sewer.

If you're unable to deliver your household hazardous waste to the Household Hazardous Waste Depot, please call the Toxic Taxi answering service at 705-560-9019 to make an appointment for free home collection service.

Please leave your name and telephone number(s). Your call will be returned in 24 hours to schedule an appointment.

You may also make a Toxic Taxi appointment by email. Simply send an email to Sudburytoxictaxi@hotzenvironmental.com detailing your name, address and the waste you have to be collected. A representative will reply with an appointment date that you will be asked to confirm.

Please note for safety reasons, the Toxic Taxi will not pick up waste if you are not home.

- All waste must be clearly labelled and in sealed containers.
- Reusable containers will not be returned (i.e. plastic gas cans).
- · Do not mix different products together.
- Syringes must be in a puncture-proof container.

Acceptable Materials

Corrugated Cardboard & Pizza Boxes –

Flatten to a 30"x30" size and remove all plastics. Do not include waxed cardboard.

Boxboard – Cereal, shoe, detergent, cracker, toothpaste, paper rolls etc. Remove plastic liners and flatten.

Newspaper, Magazines, Catalogues & Junk Mail – Newspapers, inserts, flyers, magazines, catalogues, junk mail, telephone books and hard & soft covered books.

Household Paper – Writing/printer paper, envelopes, greeting cards, non-foil gift wrap, non-treated paper bags.

Plastic Bottles, Jugs, Tubs, Pails, Trays, and Foam Packaging – Look for the #1, #2, #4, #5 and #6 recycling symbol to determine if the packaging item is recyclable. Exclude motor oil jugs, foam peanuts, foam insulation. Rinse all plastics.

Plastic Bags – Grocery, bread, produce and frozen vegetable bags, dry cleaning bags,

outer wrapper for toilet tissue and other paper products. Remove paper receipts and place bags in one tied plastic bag.

Clear & Coloured Glass Bottles & Jars -Rinse

Milk & Juice Containers/Cartons – Juice boxes, packaged milk & soy beverages, wine packs, milk cartons. Remove straws and rinse.

Egg Cartons – Paper and foam egg cartons.

Aluminum & Steel Cans, Aluminum Foil, Pie Plates and Trays – Food and beverage cans such as soda cans, vegetable cans. Rinse.

Empty Paint Cans & Aerosol Cans – Ensure paint can is empty and dry, remove lids from cans and recycle separately.

Cardboard Cans – Remove plastic seal off cardboard cans and rinse.

Winter Waste Placement





Garbage must NOT be placed on the sidewalk, traveled roadway, on top of snow banks, behind snow banks or in an area that would interfere with road or sidewalk maintenance crews.

Garbage MUST be placed in a visible location on the ground as close as possible to the roadway.
