Because you now have work and life experience, you may be eligible for credits

This means, you have the choice to do courses online, by mail or a combination of both You can start anytime and work at your own pace. You also have access to a teacher by phone or e-mail. Ontario Secondary School Certificate (OSSC)	 Granted to students who leave high school before earning their OSSD as long as 14 credits are completed 	 Good verification for recognizing your secondary school achievement if you are looking at working, taking a vocational program or short term training
Certificate of Accomplishment	Granted to students who leave high school and completed less than 14 credits	 Recognizes your achievement and completion of some secondary school courses Good if you are interested in only working or taking short courses and not going to college or taking an apprenticeship
